HISTORY IN THE MAKING

Originally, the district was serviced by a Bush Nursing Hospital located in Cobb Street, Penshurst. This building remains and is currently the home of Marie and Diane McDonald. In the early 1950's, a Dr. Watt in Penshurst and Pastor Wiebusch of the Tabor Lutheran Church were concerned that a need for a local hospital existed in Penshurst as patients requiring treatment were usually sent to Hamilton Base Hospital. To expedite a hospital project for Penshurst, they set up a committee including Mr. R. Schramm, MBE, Mr. C.G. Ross and Mr. J. Ryan to work toward the construction of a health care facility.

Leased Crown land at the Eastern end of Watton Street had been set aside for a hospital building, however, it was considered unsuitable. Mr. J.O.W. Smith donated a parcel of land presently occupied by the Hospital and additional land to the east of it, which has subsequently been sold.

Construction of the new hospital commenced on 15th August 1955, and the first patient was admitted on the 24th of July 1957. The cost of constructing and furnishing the new five-bed hospital was 46,567 pounds, of which a portion was paid by money raised by the community. A Government Grant paid for the remainder.

- August 1972, work commenced on a four-bed extension to the hospital, bringing the total to nine acute beds. This extension was funded by a Government Grant and completed in January 1973.
- 1984 brought the cessation of theatre operations, with patients then travelling to the Hamilton Base Hospital or elsewhere for surgery.
- January 1987 saw work commencing on an extension to the Hospital to provide a 10 bed Nursing Home wing. The extension resulted in a reduction of the acute beds from nine to seven. In November 1988, the first residents were admitted to the new nursing home. To recognise the efforts made by a Board of Management member, Mr. W.J. Lewis, in securing approval and funding for the project the 10-bed wing was named the W.J. Lewis Wing. The cost of the extension was \$ 528,102 of which the community raised nearly half.
- 1989 the Victorian Nursing Council reviewed the facility's midwifery services and recommended to
 the Health Department that, due to the hospital's inability to attract sufficient qualified midwifery
 staff to cover the service on a 24 hour basis, midwifery services be discontinued. This recommendation
 was accepted by the Department and subsequently, Penshurst's midwifery-based service ceased.
- 1992 builder Mark Uebergang converted the Boardroom to a patient care area. The room was
 designed to provide a service to patients with special needs. Funds for the project were provided
 through community support given to the Murray to Moyne Bicycle Team. The room's amenities
 and privacy is greatly appreciated by patients and their families. A bequest from the family of the
 late Mr. A. Uebergang provided furnishings for the room.
- 1994 the former Labour Ward and Emergency Room were converted into two 2-bed rooms with ensuites designed by Robert Miles of Mount Gambier and rebuilt by Mark Uebergang of Penshurst. This facility enabled the hospital to "bid" for the nursing-home type beds being re-allocated within the sub-region, and the nursing home capacity was subsequently increased to 16 residents.
- 1994/95 the Hospital's Board continued to work with the Shire of Mount Rouse and subsequently
 the Southern Grampians Shire (following Municipal amalgamations), to develop a total aged care
 and accommodation project based in Penshurst and extending to Dunkeld and Glenthompson.
 This project provided 2-bedroom cottages on two sites in Penshurst and Dunkeld and a 20 bed
 Hostel.
- February 1995 major fundraising commenced following a resolution by the Board to undertake a major redevelopment of the Hospital. Over 3 years funding in excess of targets enabled the renovation



- to be undertaken. In addition to the local funds, \$ 160,000 (Rural Taskforce Grant) was provided by the State Government towards the redevelopment.
- Late 1995 the Board reconsidered the Hostel design and concluded that redesign was necessary
 to accommodate changing aged care needs and the associated funding models offered by the
 Commonwealth Government.
- 27th April 1997 the Hon. D. Napthine opened the newly developed 16 bed Nursing Home.
- May 1997 construction commenced on the 10 bed Kolor Lodge Hostel.
- February 1998 the Hostel was completed and the first residents were admitted. The Hostel provides single accommodation with ensuite bathrooms. There is a large sitting room and dining room with two other guest\quiet areas.
- September 1998 the Sheppard Community Health Centre was completed. A bequest from the estate of the late A.A. Sheppard together with a HACC Grant of \$ 200,000 enabled the construction of this facility.
 - The Centre continues to be a benefit to the community providing a facility for Adult Day Activity Support Services, Allied Health Accommodation and as a venue for many outside organisations to utilise.
- January 1998 a bus was purchased for the use of Nursing Home and Kolor Lodge Residents to undertake outings as a group. The bus was replaced with a new model in 2006.
- July 1, 1998 the Western District Health Service was formed whereby the Penshurst and District Memorial Hospital became Penshurst and District Health Service – a member of the Western District Health Service.
- July 1998, the Penshurst and District Health Service received Rural Healthstreams funding approved
 by the Victorian Department of Human Services. Healthstreams is a service and funding model
 that encourages flexibility in the design and delivery of a diverse range of primary health services.
 Resulting in a more responsive, flexible and comprehensive health care system, which encourages cooperation between public health services, local private sector providers and hospital based services.

SUMMARY OF ACHIEVEMENTS 2009 / 20010

Penshurst and District Health Service (PDHS) has continued to ensure our services are directed towards meeting the needs of our consumers, including residents, patients, and the community at large. In collaboration with the other departments of the Western District Health Service, we have maintained a broad range of services that are accessible, timely and provided in accordance with the priorities outlined in our Operational Plan.

CORPORATE IDENTITY

- The Manager/Director of Nursing attended a range of meetings representing the Health Service.
- Ongoing fundraising during the year has greatly assisted our goal of continually enhancing and upgrading our facilities.
- In March 2010, our Murray to Moyne Cycle Relay Team, involving a group of dedicated riders (the *Rouse Rare Rumps*) and their support crew, raised in excess of \$7,000.
- Regular contribution to the Penshurst District News

PERFORMANCE MONITORING

- Penshurst Nursing Home and Kolor Lodge Hostel continued to remain fully compliant in all 44 Expected Outcomes under the Commonwealth Aged Care Standards when an accreditation survey was conducted in August 2009. The facilities were re-accredited until 30 October 2012. In accordance with revised practices, the Aged Care Standards and Accreditation Agency Limited also undertook unannounced Support Contact Visits in May, 2010, with full compliance maintained.
- All new staff and postgraduate nursing students on placement at the Health Service participate in a structured orientation program specific to our facility.
- Any new or updated Policies and Procedures are conveyed to staff via Staff / Quality Improvement Meetings and Memoranda.

- Results of Quality Activities are discussed at all relevant meetings and publicly displayed in main foyer on "Quality Matters" notice board.
- Our Internal Cleaning Audit results have continued to meet the benchmark throughout the year.
- PDHS is participating in the DHS PSRAC Quality of Care Performance Indicator ongoing monitoring program, which commenced in July 2007. Results are within acceptable parameters.
- Full compliance was achieved with an External Food Safety Audit conducted in January 2010.
- Investigation of all complaints was initiated within 24 hours of receipt.
- Press Ganey Patient Satisfaction Survey Achieved in top 5% of Australian facilities.

QUALITY IMPROVEMENT AND RISK MANAGEMENT INITIATIVES

- Staff completed annual Fire and Safety Competency audit.
- Staff completed "No-Lift" competency refresher education.
- Falls risk minimisation plans have been implemented for residents identified at risk.

- Regular Maternal and Child Health Clinics were conducted at Penshurst.
- Community Services Action Plan developed.
- Co-ordination and implementation of Sustainable Farm Families in conjunction with the Penshurst Football Netball Club.



HUMAN RESOURCE MANAGEMENT

- PDHS is participating in the Western District Health Service Registered Nurse Division One and Division Two Graduate Program and a rotation program for second year nursing graduates.
- Several new volunteers commenced during the past year.

- 100% hi lo electric beds throughout the Nursing Home, Acute and Kolor Lodge.
- Ceiling tracking to acute rooms.
- Refurbishment of Acute Hospital Rooms.

- Penshurst Nursing Home and Kolor Lodge Hostel occupancy maintained at high levels throughout the year, with waiting lists for both facilities.
- A favourable End of Year financial result, with a small operating surplus, was achieved.

PERFORMANCE MONITORING

The facility participates in numerous audits both internal and external to ensure a high standard of services are provided across the organisation.

Internal audits measure performance:

- 1. Across the 44 Aged Care expected outcomes and are benchmarked against the other 4 WDHS aged care sites.
- 2. Monitoring security processes within the organisation.
- 3. Cleanliness of all service areas within the organisation reported at WDHS level.
- 4. Food plan and kitchen services.

External audits include:

- 1. Department of Human Services benchmarking (KPI program).
- 2. Food plan and kitchen services (Shire Council).
- 3. Fire safety audit.

In addition to ensure quality services can be provided by the organisation the facility keeps a record of and reports on all comments, complaints, compliments and opportunities for improvement suggestions.

Feedback to the organisation is promoted through resident and relatives and staff meetings all of which are held on a monthly basis.



INFECTION CONTROL

Many strategies have been established at Penshurst District Health Service (PDHS) to ensure an effective infection control program. The goal of the program is to reduce the incidence of preventable infections.

Staff, patients and visitors can be at risk of developing an infection while in the health care setting. This risk can be minimised by adopting infection control policies and procedures. These polices are referenced to current state and commonwealth guidelines and legislation.

Regular internal audits include observation of hand hygiene opportunities, jewellery compliance, staff knowledge of infection control and gastroenteritis.

The staff are observed during their clinical work and observed how often they decontaminate their hands, and compared to the opportunities in which, hand hygiene should be attended.

HAND HYGIENE OPPURTUNITY RESULTS –

Baseline of 69% which was well above the state average June 09- 65% 17 out of 26 opportunities Jan10-76% 19 out of 25 opportunities Results are expected to be above 60%

Immunisation- staff, were offered the Panvax vaccine (swine flu) with approx 50% of staff taking up the offer. Many staff attended the medical group clinics so exact numbers of staff vaccinated are not known. The seasonal influenza vaccine program has commenced and is offered to staff, volunteers and residents of the Aged Care facility.


- 2007-72%(state average -45%)

- 2009-64% (state average -53%)

Surveillance of infections continue, with all aged care infections reported electronically on the residents record, investigated and reported onto riskman. Data is kept of individual resident

infections and when trends are found strategies are put in place to reduce the incidence of infection.

The acute patients are surveyed under Victorian Hospital Acquired Infection Surveillance (VICNISS). Data continues to be collected monthly for Occupational Exposures, with 1 reported this year. Multi Resistant Organisms (MROs), Blood Stream Infections (BSI), and deep organ space infection data is also collected with none of these infections reported. Cleaning audits continue on a bi monthly basis with all audits over the acceptable level of 85%.

No outbreaks or clusters of infections have been reported this year.

In the 1970's and 80's Florence also worked part time night duty at Penshurst.

Florence presently helps run their farm at Minhamite and is also a member of the Penshurst Football Netball Club.





Manager / Director Of Nursing Report

I am pleased to have this opportunity to report on the achievements of the organisation over the previous 12 months.

We have settled into the refurbished acute rooms and dining room/lounge in the nursing home and the improvements have made a huge impact on the day to day lives of our residents and patients. The courtyard has been utilised a great deal by residents, staff and their family and the access ramp to the rear yard has allowed for beautiful BBQs particularly in the summer months.

Throughout the last 12 months we have seen various comings and goings of staff across the organisation but have successfully maintained a productive and caring approach to our residents. To name all of the staff responsible for the homelike, friendly and welcoming atmosphere of the facility would take pages but all staff across the care, education, maintenance, cleaning, administration, kitchen and activities areas are equally important parts of the organisation and I thank them for their ongoing work. I would especially like to thank Jenny Paton who in the Nurse Unit Manager role, has a great understanding of the needs of our staff and residents and who has provided me a great deal of backup and support.

Aged Care Accreditation occurred in August 2009 for both Kolor Lodge and the Nursing Home. The assessors who visited Penshurst campus as part of their review were very positive for the organisation with comments that we not only met but exceeded the standards in providing high level care in a home like environment.

The many hours contributed by our volunteers, whose efforts have assisted us in many ways, and the dedicated work of members of the Pastoral Care Group, is also most appreciated. At the risk of offending others I would in particularly like to note the tireless work of Tony Auden who has maintained the gardens at an exceptionally high level, assisted residents by building a garden

shed in the Kolor yard, and who has stepped into the maintenance role to provide efficient and competent maintenance of the facility during our handyman's leave. I would also like to comment on the ongoing commitment of Evan "Scotty" Kelly who racks up many kilometres transporting residents to appointments, doing the strength training bus run every Monday and generally being on call when needed.

Thanks must also be extended to Dr Michael Forster and his team at Kimberley Clinic who shows outstanding support to our staff, residents, and patients – they are truly an asset to the whole community. We welcomed Dr Mohammed Abdullah during the year and have already seen the benefits of having a fulltime clinic and regular back up for Dr Forster's leave periods.

Fundraising efforts continued throughout the year. SERVICES

Penshurst and District Health Service (a member of the Western District Health Service) is a public hospital providing:

- **Acute Care:** inpatient care for six acute care patients.
- Nursing Home (High Level): residential accommodation for seventeen permanent nursing home residents.
- **Hostel** (**Low Level**): residential accommodation for nine permanent residents and one respite resident.
- **Independent Living Units:** At Penshurst and Dunkeld providing independent living for ten residents.
- HACC Services Meals on Wheels Service operates from the facility seven days per week. An Adult Day Activity Support Service meets weekly in the Sheppard Community centre.
- Allied Health: Other services delivered by visiting therapists include, Podiatry, Physiotherapy, Dietitian, Asthma and Diabetes Educators, Women's Health.

CATCHMENT AREA

The catchment area of the Penshurst and District Health Service comprises the area in South Western Victoria bounded by Dunkeld, Glenthompson in the north, Chatsworth in the east, Hawkesdale and Macarthur in the south and about 15 km's along the Hamilton Highway in the west. This region corresponds to part of the Southern Grampians Shire (former Shire of Mount Rouse and parts of the former Shire of Dundas) and part of the Shire of Moyne (parts of former Shires of Minhamite and Warrnambool).

POPULATION

The 2006 Census, conducted by the Australian Bureau of Statistics, indicated that the population within the catchment area of the Penshurst and District Health Service was ageing at a higher rate than the State generally. The median age of the catchment population in the 2006 Census was 43 years and over 83% of the catchment population stated that they were Australian-born. English was stated as the only language spoken at home by 92% of the catchment population.



Men's Out and About Program

The men's out and about program was a WDHS initiative resulting from a grant application under the DHS social inclusion program.

The program recognises men as a minority group in residential aged care facilities and aims to bring these men from the 6 WDHS aged care campuses together to mix socially.

The program involves appointment of a project worker for 12 months and establishment of a steering committee.

PDHS M/DON is the executive sponsor of the program.

Sustainable Farm Families

In 2009 PDHS successfully received funding to run the sustainable farm families program at Penshurst. The program is a joint program with the Penshurst Football/Netball Club and runs over 3 years.

The project looks at promoting health for farming families in our community.



COMMUNITY SERVICES AND ALLIED HEALTH

Staff from Community Services and Allied Health have enjoyed another year providing a range of services to the Penshurst community. Penshurst and District Health Service is a warm and welcoming place to visit and we thank the Penshurst staff and residents for their zest and support.

The following staff have been delivering services this year, Physio team - Zita Arends, Rebecca Redpath, Yvette Schmal and Ruchi Agrawal; Podiatry - Phuong Huynh and Clare Barrand; Nutrition and Dietetics - Reena Soniassy and Suzi Talevska; ADASS - Brenda Uebergang, Brigitte Tresidder, Kate Coote, Michelle Maslen and Nicole Landwehr; Women's Health Nurse - Sue Watt.

NUTRITION AND DIETETICS

Penshurst and District Health Service has continued to provide enjoyment in the workplace and professional challenges for all Dietitians who have taken on the responsibility to work with the staff, residents and community members at Penshurst. Reena Soniassy was no exception to the above and commenced her services to Penshurst in May 2007 until March this year. She has ventured across water, leaving Australian soil for the All Black territory in Auckland where she now resides and works as a Dietitian.

During her time at Penshurst she has supported Quality Improvement projects including: the Menu review; an assessment of calcium intake for residents and resulting action plan increasing dairy foods; Staff In-services on nutrition in the elderly and also conducted weight management and healthy eating sessions during Healthy Weight Week this year. She continued to assess and provide recommendations for all residents and perform outpatient consultations.

We wish Reena all the very best on her future life endeavours and thank her for her valuable contributions.

We would like to warmly welcome Suzi Talevska a new dietitian to WDHS commencing in April this year. She has been orientated at Penshurst and will continue to provide services to this area. She brings with her three years of experience as a dietitian where she worked at St Vincents Hospital in Melbourne.

PODIATRY

In the last financial year, the increased staffing level of two full time podiatrists has enabled us to service clients of the Western District more efficiently, with no current waiting list. We are also able to increase services to Coleraine and Penshurst District Health Services to four visits per month.

In addition to our Outpatients, Home visits and Residential care visits to Grange and Birches, we also visit Eventide Lutheran Homes. At present, our regional services include Harrow and Balmoral Bush Nursing Centres and Macarthur Health Centre.

The demand for our service is always increasing and we are in the process of identifying areas to enhance clients' journey that would be valuable and beneficial with access to our service delivery.

PHYSIOTHERAPY

The Physiotherapy Department with the administrative support of the Sheppard Community Centre reception staff have continued to provide a service to Penshurst & District Health Service. With just under 275 hours of service provision for patients of the Acute Hospital, residents of the Penshurst Nursing Home and Kolor Lodge Hostel and community clients out of the Physiotherapy Clinic. The department has also supported two current PDHS staff undergo additional training for their Allied Health Assistant Certificates. We wish them all the best in completing their studies and will continue to support and work with them to provide a wide-range of Physiotherapy Services to the Penshurst community.

CONTINENCE SERVICE REPORT

The Western District Health Service – Continence Service visit the Penshurst and District Health Service regularly throughout the year.

Services provided are :-

- Inpatient care with continence needs.
- Catheter care.
- Bowel Management.
- Continence assessment to hostel and nursing home clients.
- Staff in-service education.



• Community education in relation to continence.

The continence staff -Sue Frost, Amanda Francis and Ruth Fatone continue to provide care to inpatient and outpatients within Penshurst Health Service and the surrounding communities.

TRANSPORT- PENSHURST

The Penshurst community has demonstrated their support for activities of the South West Transport Connections through the growing patronage of the Penshurst to Hamilton trial bus service. The weekly service on Thursdays has been expanded with a second service on Mondays commencing on 21st September 2009. Passenger numbers on both services have increased. The twice weekly trial service has been approved for a further twelve months and another review of the services will take place in the coming year.

GO FOR YOUR LIFE – PENSHURST CAMPUS (PAULINE TEMPLAR)

- Initially Penshurst campus funded Tai Chi sessions with instructor David Skene – Tai Chi is now funded by individuals.
- 7 10 regular participants, diverse age group of community members. Participants are required to pay five dollars per session, this is covers the cost of petrol money of instructor.
- Workplace change.
- Resident changes fresh fruit is offered for residents and staff for morning tea. Drink vending machines include low sugar drinks and water.

WorkHealth Penshurst

- Initial discussions with Damien Malone, about organising a community event that includes WorkHealth checks (Mid April).
- Discuss a Men's Health Night/ Community Health Night we are currently working with Balmoral Bush Nursing Centre, with a focus on males health (this is going to be a pilot for this project). There has been limitations with this as we are not the organiser of this event.
- Another idea discussed was making appointments with workplaces in Penshurst in regards to applications for WorkHealth.

This may be useful in gathering information on community needs in regards to health information, instead of surveys/ questionnaire. Idea was myself or another worker would go to the workplace with the laptop and the information would be entered at the time and date would be set.

SUSTAINABLE FARM FAMILIES

With some trepidation 19 farming men and women from the Penshurst and District community, participated in the first year of the Penshurst Sustainable Farm Families (SFF) Program.

The SFF team, Department. Of Primary Industries and local Health Service staff RNs Russell Armstrong and Sally Giddens provided a wealth of knowledge and information, health assessments and 1 on 1 health consultations for the participants.

The program was conducted after Penshurst and District Health Service in partnership with the Penshurst Football/Netball Club were successful in receiving a grant to hold the 3 year program locally for the community.

Penshurst Football Netball Club President Brendan Kelly said 'it's not easy getting time off farm, but there comes a point where you have to put your health, wellbeing and farm safety first."

SFF™ workshops were free and covered a range of health topics including cardiovascular disease, diabetes, stress farm health and safety, nutrition and exercise. They also included a 20 minute one-on-one physical assessment.

A highlight of the two days was a supermarket tour to Coles in Hamilton to learn about healthy foods and choices.

Healthy catering was kindly provided by St Joseph's P&F group.

Results from previous SFF™ workshops showed 963 farmers who participated in workshops held last year revealed 73 per cent of men and 61 percent of women were classified as overweight or obese, instantly putting them into a high risk category for cardiovascular disease, cancer, diabetes and osteoarthritis.

Just over one third of participants were also identified as having high blood pressure.

Local registered nurse, and PDHS Education Co-ordinator Russell Armstrong commented that "there were some cases where participants had significant risk factors for diseases such as diabetes, cardiovascular disease and arthritis which were identified at the workshops, which could have otherwise gone unchecked".

High risk participants such as these were referred for follow up with appropriate health professionals and the workshops provide an opportunity for farmers to understand their own health risks, how to manage them and integrate them into farming life.

Sustainable Farm Families[™] is an award winning initiative of Western District Health Service, Hamilton, delivered in partnership with the Victorian Department of Primary Industries.




This year our major challenge came when we decided to change our medication administration




ever growing team. Also Diedre Matuschka has also commenced work with extended cleaning hours in Kolor Lodge.


We wish to thank the clubs and individuals of Penshurst and District that provide their time so generously for the delivery of meals on wheels to the frail and elderly of our community.






EDUCATION REPORT

Many in-service sessions have taken place, which includes the education needs of all staff at the Penshurst Campus of WDHS. Ongoing mandatory education and competencies are being attended to by all staff.



We continue to increase the number of competencies available to our staff online via the internet, which also allows staff to complete the educational competencies from their own homes via the WDHS internet site.

We continue to support the graduate nurse program, which involves both RN division 1 and RN division 2 nurses coming to Penshurst District Health Services on a rotation.

This year we have also 3 school based Trainees that work alongside our staff on a one day per week basis. This allows the trainees to gain valuable experience and an in-site into the career that these students wish to work towards, whilst still maintaining their education commitment.

During the last 12 months number of staff have completed fully funded education opportunities thru various sources of funded, This has allowing our staff to either update or obtain further Qualifications, with studies being mostly self directed at the participants own pace and within their own homes. We currently have staff enrolled in: Certificate IV in Allied Health, Certificate IV in Aged Care. All of which are a great benefit for our Health Service.

Medication Administration has been a large focus for Penshurst District Health Service this year.

We have run our own sessions of education, which along with a written competency and practical competency, has seen all of our non-endorsed staff been deemed competent in Medication administration from blister packs.

In addition to this in house education, a number of staff have gained their medication endorsement thru the Nurses Board of Victoria, after successfully completing the medication endorsement course for Registered Division Two nurses thru the Horsham campus of the University of Ballarat. Well done to all staff that have committed their time to this course. External education on medication administration has also been delivered by PDHS staff.

Many of our staff have also attended external studies in their own time and at their own cost, which has great benefits to patients and residents care, and for the general community as a whole.

PDHS has also delivered a Sustained Farm Families program in Penshurst during March, in collaboration with The Penshurst Football & Netball Club. The program was delivered over two days and involved 20 Farm family participants from the Penshurst District. The program involved health education sessions from various presenters and an individual health check – from which referral for follow up medical care where made. The program is run over three years, with a follow up days in 2011 and 2012.

MAINTENANCE


Maintenance services continue to be provided at PDHS by Stuart Graham in conjunction with the maintenance team at WDHS – Hamilton Campus.

We thank our local contractors who provide fast and efficient support to the facility for both planned and emergency requirements.









LOCAL VOLUNTEER PROGRAM

Profile -

GUEST SPEAKER - 2010 ANNUAL MEETING PROF. KENNETH WILLIAM HINCHCLIFF BVSC (HONS), MS, PHD, DACVIM

Ken grew up in Penshurst, after moving there as a 7 year old, and lived at 23 French Street with his mother, Bunny and sister, Nonee. Ken attended Penshurst Primary School and then Hamilton College, completing "matric" in 1974. A keen angler, shooter and field naturalist, Ken gravitated towards study of veterinary science as a result of his experience on his grandparents' farm at Hexham.

A 1980 graduate of the Melbourne Veterinary School, Ken is Dean of the Faculty of Veterinary Science at the University of Melbourne. After several years in practice in Victoria, including 8 months in Hamilton, he completed an advanced training program in large animal internal medicine at the University of Wisconsin-Madison, and a PhD at the Ohio State University. Ken was a faculty member in the College of Veterinary Medicine at OSU, rising to professor, before joining the University of Melbourne in 2007.

He is a registered specialist in equine medicine and the author of over 150 peer-reviewed scientific publications, several scholarly books including the 9th and 10th (2006) editions of "Veterinary Medicine: a textbook of the diseases of cattle, horses, sheep, pigs and goats", the first edition (2004) of the definitive, 1900 page, textbook "Equine Sports Medicine: basic and clinical sciences of the equine athlete", the 2nd edition of "Five Minute Veterinary Consult – Equine" (2009) numerous book chapters, and other scholarly works.

Professor Hinchcliff's research is focused on exercise science, and in particular the use of furosemide horses. His recent publication, with Drs. Morley and Guthrie, on the efficacy of furosemide in the treatment of exercise-induced pulmonary haemorrhage in the Journal of the American Veterinary Medical Association Journal attracted worldwide interest including reports in the New York Times.

Ken now lives in Williamstown with his wife, Carole, and daughter Alex.
